## Became Entirely Ready

What is the meaning of the word *defect*? What is the meaning of the word *shortcoming*? Those are two words that we hear often when we are discussing *steps six and seven*, and we sometimes get caught up in the semantics of the words and it distracts us from really getting to the heart of the matter. I can understand why a person could get a little confused since they both obviously imply that there is something wrong, but if they are intended to be synonymous why did they not include them both in step six or step seven? Early in my sobriety I heard one version that implied that they didn't want to be redundant when they wrote the *big book* and when I think back on it, I see that as a weak explanation. When I read the *twelve and twelve*, I see a much more active role expected of us than simply asking God to rid us of these faults. Understanding that the founders never wanted to edit the Big Book, I can see that these issues had to be addressed and by publishing the *twelve and twelve* they could provide amplifying information on these and many other ideas that were unclear to the rest of us.

In order to find a simple framework that makes it easy to get the best results as I addressed these two steps I had to come up with a way to conform to the spirit of the program and

rid myself of my obvious character flaws. To put it in simple terms, I might use an example that we are all familiar with: If a person purchases a new car and several month later they discover a defect in the braking system causing the car to continue to roll forward when you apply the brakes, the car would be recalled, the defect would be corrected, and the brakes would perform properly each time you put your foot down on the pedal. The defect was the faulty brakes, and the shortcoming was the behavior of the car. It wouldn't stop properly. Once the defect was corrected, the shortcoming went away.

While talking to a close friend of mine about *gossiping about others* his comment on the matter was that "*All forms of criticism and character assignation stem from low self-esteem.*" The low self-esteem was the defect that caused the gossip (shortcoming). Since that conversation, whenever I caught myself wanting to criticize others I replaced the gossip with compassionate understanding and took the fallback position such as: There are two ways to have the tallest building in town. 1) Build the tallest building or 2) Tear all of the other buildings down around you. When I saw how pathetic that behavior was, I quickly started to remove it from my day to day interactions with others. (Stop the gossip) I try to use this type of model on all of the defects as I discover them and it seems to have taken all of the power out of them. This is a never-ending process and nothing has served me better. Discover and correct the defects and the shortcomings disappear. My shortcomings were apparent to everyone but my defects of character were not. When I could identify them in myself, all I had to do was to use a little self-restraint and the results were amazing. When I asked my higher power to remove my

shortcomings, I became *entirely ready* and this process became the answer I was searching for and as a result, most of the guilt and shame has dissolved into nothingness. I don't let the semantics of the two words, *defect and shortcoming*; stop me from applying a model that works for me. I am a firm believer in step study meetings and have been attending one weekly ever since I got sober in 1969. I liken it to a rock tumbler. Each time you go through a cycle, slowly but surely, all of the rough edges are worn down and soon you begin to evolve to the finished product that you envisioned. This is one that really worked for me.

- Is it good for a group to lease a small building?
- Are all the officers and members of our local club for AAs familiar with "Guidelines on Clubs," which is available free from GSO?
- Should the secretary of our group serve on the mayor's advisory committee on alcoholism?
- Some alcoholics will stay around AA only if we have a TV and card room. If this is what is required to carry the message to them, should we have these facilities?

### **FROM YOUR STEERING COMMITTEE**

This is my take on Tradition Six. I am not authority on this subject, this is solely my opinion. I would encourage everyone to read the book "12 Steps and 12 Traditions" for further amplification.

This Tradition tells me several things. Don't get involved in other's business for starters, stay on task and concentrate on helping alcoholics which is our primary purpose. If we lend our name, our money or our reputation to others there will be conflict. Conflict from within and from outside A.A. There are many seemingly worthwhile organizations or groups that could perhaps benefit from A.A. involvement but it is best to let them take care of themselves. Also we could run the risk of having our credibility, trust and usefulness undermined by selfish behaviors outside of our Fellowship. God's will be done.

## Concept Six

*On behalf of A.A. as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principal responsibility for the maintenance of our world services, and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the Conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the Conference when they act among themselves as the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous.*

This is the sixth in a series of 12 short articles designed to provide our members with a practical understanding of both the intentions and the substance of our founders' thinking with regard to the relationship of each individual A.A. member with the organization as a whole. These 12 ideas are the principles which guide the organization and management of A.A. affairs and the "chain of trust" that makes each of us responsible in our own ways for the continuity of our Fellowship.

In articles published over the last few months, we have seen that the "final responsibility and ultimate authority" for A.A. service activities rest with the A.A. groups (that's Concept I). But to carry out this responsibility they must, along with other groups in their Area (Arizona) elect a delegate to the Conference (Concept II), and the Conference, in turn, must then delegate administrative authority to the General Service Board of Trustees.

In fact, the trustees bear both the legal and the practical responsibility for the operation of all of A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc., which is a separate corporation. This represents a significant responsibility, since the combined cash flow of these combined entities was well over \$8 million in 2016. In addition to their considerable financial duties, the trustees also supervise all of A.A.'s public information activities, they are the guardians of our Twelve Traditions, and they oversee the carrying of the message to other countries around the world.

In his writings, Bill explained it this way: "Indeed, our world service structure resembles that of a large

corporation. (Your) A.A. groups are the stockholders, and (your) delegates represent you, like proxy-holders, at the annual meeting; the General Service Board of Trustees are actually the directors of a 'holding company' that actually owns and controls both A.A. World Services and the Grapevine, Inc., which actually carry out the services.

"Quite obviously," he continues, "our trustees must be given large powers if they are to manage the . . . affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous."

## Sobriety and Service

The three words surrounding our Fellowship's symbol, the equilateral triangle so familiar to us all – **Recovery** (via the Twelve Steps), **Unity** (as mandated by the Twelve Traditions) . . . and **Service** (what?).

Actually, there is a single name and a special significance to these three aspects – **they are the Three Legacies of Alcoholics Anonymous.**

And yes, the third aspect of the program's ongoing principles – **the Third Legacy** -- is **Service.**



Why is this important for all of us? Well, to observe, understand and live by all three of A.A.'s Legacies offers us the firmest conceptual foundation possible for solid, stable sobriety throughout the days, months and years of

our booze-free lives.

Of these Legacies, it is the Third Legacy, Service, that offers the greatest, widest and broadest choice of actions to reinforce our growth in A.A. through what St. Francis calls "self-forgetting" – that is, using our sobriety to help others *as our primary purpose.*

Another way of looking at service (in its many forms) is to think of it as *the actions that preserve our sobriety over time and move our lives forward as we remove ourselves from the bondage of self.*

The most fundamental service action, one that benefits both ourselves and other recovering alcoholics, is regular attendance at meetings, where we are given the opportunity of sharing our experience, strength and hope with groups of others who may need to hear exactly what we say and to feel exactly what we feel.

The same is true of sponsorship, once we have prepared by honestly working all twelve steps of the A.A. program.

Yet another feature of meetings, one we should always remain aware of, is that our small contributions to the 7<sup>th</sup> Tradition at each meeting also counts as direct service to our self-supporting Fellowship as a portion of what we contribute is often passed along to other service units within A.A., such as the General Service Office, the InterGroup Office, and/or the District (and/or a Sub-District), and our Area (Arizona).

Finally, there is active service that keeps the Fellowship going at the local level through the mechanical (yet ultimately most valuable) functions of meeting set-up, conduct (meeting set-up, reader, leader/chairperson, and clean-up) and outreach services such as Home Group Member, General Service Representative, InterGroup Representative, Grapevine Representative, or H&I representative.

So take out a chip and look at it. Now concentrate on those three words that are 'underlined' by each of the equal lines in our triangle. And pay particular attention to the one on the right – Service.

Right?

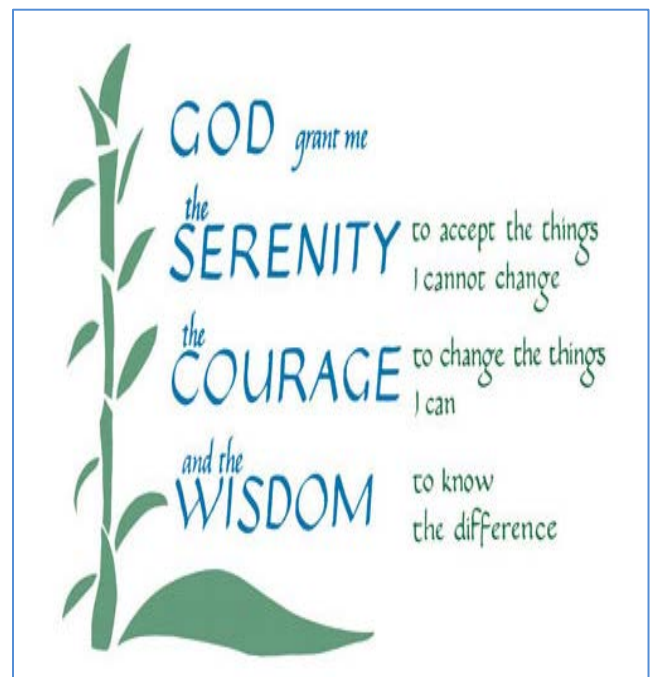

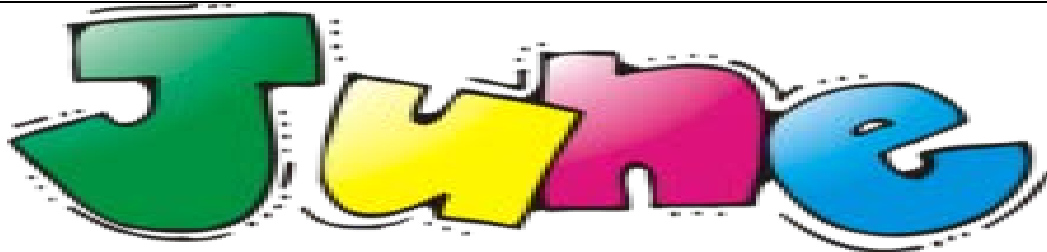
