## The Rocks, the Stones and the Pebbles

*My conscience would never let me rest*

Coming to Alcoholics Anonymous from a pit of despair was the best decision I have ever made. My life up to that point was in shambles and I was desperate enough to seek outside help. Understanding the part that alcohol played in my life, up to that point, was difficult but I knew that if I didn't get a grip on reality, I was going to self-destruct and the progression of the problem was like going ninety miles an hour down that dead end street. Hope was established immediately as I was introduced to possibility that I could be restored to a life that was free of the mental torment that I had been experiencing since childhood. The answers to all of my problems came in the form of a *Profound Change of Perception* concerning *how I perceived myself*. With very little discipline or structure in my upbringing, I was insecure and afraid that I would never meet up with the standards of my peers and as the results of that way of thinking, I developed a dishonest and selfish lifestyle which eventually caught up with me in the form of a guilty conscience. My drinking solved that problem for a time but when the tolerance for alcohol wore off, I found myself back in that pit of despair. When I looked in the mirror, I hated what I saw and I could no longer drink it away. Like everyone else, when introduced to the program, I first had to stop the (emotional) bleeding by dealing with the current issues that I had been neglecting such as: pay the rent, pay the traffic ticket, clear the beer cans off my dresser..... Then I could give the steps of the program the attention they would need if I wanted the relief that they promised. Without even being aware of it, the process had begun. With a new attitude of willingness, and attending as many meetings as I could, I was already getting rid of many of the obvious habits of dishonesty, neglect, irresponsibility, and the like. Next, I was faced with my biggest challenge which came in the form of *The Wreckage of the Past* that many refer to as a *Sack of Rocks*. If we ever want to be free of the guilt and the shame CAUSED BY the regrettable memories that we have been harboring, in our conscience, we will have to address these issues *when we become strong enough*. My sack contained a few Rocks that were obvious, a handful of Stones, and abundance of, less threatening, Pebbles that were not that obvious to me at the time. Addressing steps 4, 5, 8, and 9 concerning these issues became my greatest challenge and my first instinct was to skip over the most embarrassing memories. That Idea, I think, is common in many of us, when first faced with reparation process. I gave it my best shot at first but left out a few of the Rocks due to my ego,

Had I not done that, I believe the rest of the program would have been a shallow façade and I would never have attained the peace of mind that I enjoy today. The Stones were the things that got most of the attention as I did the steps initially. As I became stronger, I took that leap of faith and tackled the Rocks. After cleaning up those issues, the rest of the program became easy. No more denial and much more peace of mind. So I'm finished, Right? Not so fast Huckleberry! Now I become aware of the less threatening pebbles in the form of the selfish motives in my day to day decision making which I will gladly correct, one pebble at a time as I become aware of them and it is a Joy to rid myself of the things that used to plague me and today, life is good.



## FROM YOUR STEERING COMMITTEE

### Tradition Four ✓ Checklist

**Tradition Four:** *Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole.*

1. Do I insist that there are only a few right ways of doing things in AA?
2. Does my group always consider the welfare of the rest of AA? Of nearby groups? Of loners in Alaska? Of Internationalists miles from port? Of a group in Rome or El Salvador?
3. Do I put down other members' behavior when it is different from mine, or do I learn from it?

4. Do I always bear in mind that, to those outsiders who know I am in AA, I may to some extent represent our entire beloved Fellowship?
5. Am I willing to help a newcomer go to any lengths – his lengths, not mine – to stay sober?
6. Do I share my knowledge of AA tools with other members who may not have heard of them?



### Tradition 4

We have learned already that whenever two or more alcoholics are gathered to practice AA principles, it is an AA group if they say so. Any AA group has the right to conduct its meetings and business as it feels fit to carry the message even if it is wrong. Also every AA group as the right to form its own customs through the group conscience. The fourth tradition can also be looked at like the fourth step. The alcoholic uses the steps to achieve healthy sobriety, the group must use the traditions to learn how to thrive and learn its own sober living. The group should take an honest inventory and ask itself: Are we breaking traditions, or are we hindering our group, the newcomers, and individuals by our practices? Does our group have antics that put us outside the fellowship? Does the group have any underlying desires or have we taken actions that may harm AA as a whole, or have we aligned ourselves with others that may harm our group or AA? The AA group can form an EGO just like the individual and feel that they may need to shout from the roof tops. Remember that the groups' sole purpose is to carry the message, and not act like children of chaos, trying to burn the traditions and group customs. You can judge the health of your group by what it does in-between group business meeting, the group can ask itself is there more we can do to stay informed and NOT wither away by desires of the heart and carry the message? Remember the highest position in AA is servant.

## Concept Four ✓ Checklist

**Concept IV: At all responsible levels, we ought to maintain a traditional “Right of Participation,” allowing a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge.**

1. Do we understand the spiritual principles underlying the “right of Participation”?
2. What does “in reasonable proportion” mean? Do we understand when it is appropriate for A.A. paid staff to have a vote at the General Service Conference or in our local service structure?
3. Do we expect that, because we are A.A. members, we should be allowed to vote at any group, even if we are not active members of that group?



### April - Concept 4

*“Throughout our Conference structure, we ought to maintain at all responsible levels a traditional “Right of Participation,” taking care that each classification or group of our world servants shall be allowed a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge”*

This concept focuses on the “Right of Participation.” At the General Service Conference, voting members include not only delegates, but also the trustees, and the directors and staff members of A.A. World Services (i.e., G.S.O.) and the A.A. Grapevine. This furthers the AA position that no member is placed in “ultimate authority” over another. All votes hold equal weight and each voting member is only permitting to vote once during an election.

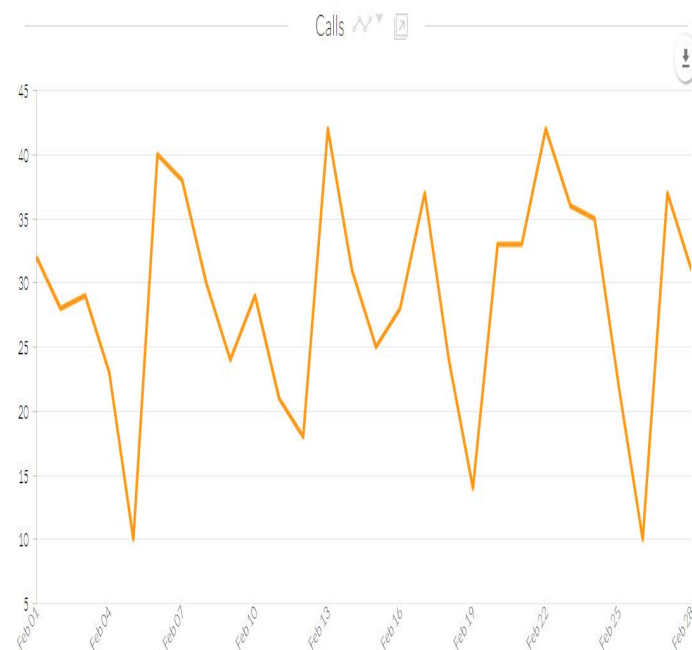

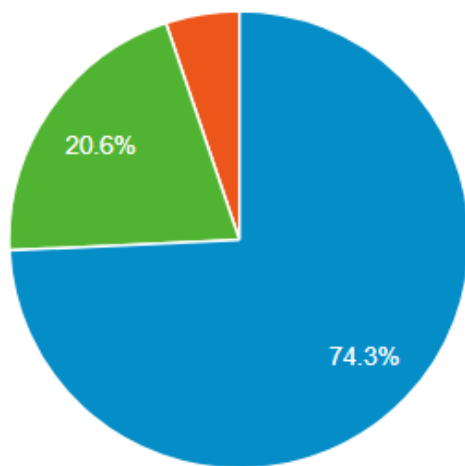
