Problem by Problem or Principle by Principle

It Renders My EGO a Weak Contender

When people come through the doors of Alcoholics Anonymous they are usually overwhelmed with problems. Some of these problems are of a legal nature, while others may be due to marital strife, and still others may just be because of desperation due to a life that has been spinning out of control. The one thing that is the common denominator in all of these matters is the use of alcohol otherwise, why would they be coming to A.A.?

In the beginning you will hear the horror stories of the divorce proceedings or of the legal fees for the DUI case and you will see well-meaning members of the program telling them how to get around some of these problems and when, occasionally, that person gets away with it, he thinks that the DUI was the problem, but as we know, it was but a symptom of the real problem, that being alcoholism.

Most of the wreckage of the past is the result of our unbridled thinking and if, in the beginning, we focus only on getting out of trouble and not focusing on the thinking that got us into those difficulties in the first place, it often gives us the feeling that we are on safe ground and can relax. A halfhearted effort concerning our decision making just leads to more faulty thinking and rationalizing why we do what we do. This often leads to a succession of relapses before that person finally crosses that line where he is opened to change and if, at that time, he is encouraged to learn to live by proven principles and not to modify those principles to suit his/her own selfish agenda, he/she finally has a chance to live a meaningful life.

My experience has been that, living by principles is much easier than anything I could have come up with myself. When we solve a problem and we don't change our behavior, it's only a matter of time before another similar problem arrives. We can solve one problem at a time or, we can set in place, a principle that governs many problems of a similar nature. Take for instance: Cash register honesty. This, to me, means much more than just

not cheating the person at the cash register. It means that I should never take an unfair advantage of anyone. With this approach in mind, I think before I act and, I get it right the first time and as the result, I have a clear conscience.

Why focus on one problem at a time when I can live by unselfish principles and take the decision making out of the equation. If I can just be honest with myself and do what's right, it takes away all of the guilt and shame and lightens my spirit. This is reward enough for me and it far outweighs any material gain I could have acquired by taking the selfish path and after practicing this way of thinking, over a period of time, my load gets lighter and lighter.

My EGO seems to run my problems and strives for material victory over them, while my Conscience decides my principles and when I follow the dictates of my conscience, I stop making the mistakes of the past and my spirit heals. I'm no longer ashamed of my behavior and over a period of time, as I continue to rely on my conscience to fashion a life of unselfish principles, a drink has no appeal to me and, in the end, it renders my EGO a weak contender.

1. Do I criticize or do I trust and support my group officers, AA committees, and office workers? Newcomers? Old-timers?
2. Am I absolutely trustworthy, even in secret, with AA Twelfth Step jobs or other AA responsibility? 2
3. Do I look for credit in my AA jobs? Praise for my AA ideas?
4. Do I have to save face in group discussion, or can I yield in good spirit to the group conscience and work cheerfully along with it?
5. Although I have been sober a few years, am I still willing to serve my turn at AA chores?
6. In group discussions, do I sound off about matters on which I have no experience and little knowledge?

Concept Two ✓ Checklist

The General Service Conference of A.A. has become, for nearly every practical purpose, the active voice and the effective conscience of our whole Society in its world affairs.

1. Do we have an understanding of the history of the General Service Conference (the "Conference")?
2. What is a Conference Advisory Action? Does our home group's G.S.R., D.C.M., area delegate report back to the group on the highlights of the Conference and Conference Advisory Actions?
3. Is our group meeting its wider Seventh Tradition responsibilities?

Are you informed enough and trust God enough to where you don't need to criticize, gossip, or seek praise for your ideas and service commitments. Do I cause conflict on purpose just get my point across or do I allow others to speak freely though a God of their own understanding? We must never set barriers of rules or opinions that could harm the newcomer or the group conscience. I must at all cost trust the group right or wrong, and remember right or wrong is just my opinion and not Gods, or that of the group conscience's. The highest position ever in A.A. is Servant.

Concept Two

A.A.'s service affairs are handled by delegation. Groups delegate (or don't) their group's leadership role to the General Service Conference. Therefore, the General Service Conference of A.A. is "the actual voice and effective conscience of our whole Society in its world affairs." Here is how it's done:

- Groups elect a General Service Representative (G.S.R)
- G.S.R.'s meet regularly in area assemblies.
- Every two years they (the G.S.R's) elect a delegate from among their number.
- Every April, those elected delegates from the 93 areas in the U.S. and Canada meet for six days with the trustees of the General Service Board, the staffs of the General Service Office, the A.A. Grapevine, and certain other service workers to handle the business of A.A.

My VERY late report from my Intergroup/Central Office/AAWS/AAGV Seminar

I was blessed to attend the 32nd Annual ICOAA Seminar located in Herndon Virginia. The Seminar was hosted by the Northern Virginia Intergroup held October 5th-8th, 2017. This Seminar is held annually and is an opportunity for the Office Managers/Assistants to get together and

share *our* experience, strength and hope as well as exchange ideas. Staff from the General Service Office were present as well as staff from Grapevine.

There are multiple workshops to attend going at all hours of the day. Generally when I go to this Seminar it is a good 12hr day, each day. I attended the following workshops and will give you a brief synopsis of each.

Friday 10:30am-11:30 am

Workshop 1B: Online Services, Websites & Technologies

This workshop covered options for different backup software, search engine optimization as well as how to best set up your website to be user friendly.

Friday 1:00pm-2:00pm

Workshop 2B: Employment Policies, pay-scales & benefits for paid workers & volunteer responsibilities & challenges

This workshop focused on Policy & Procedure Manuals, Operation Manuals for the different paid positions at offices, comp time for paid employees staying late for Committee Meetings or events, insurance benefits. The Central Offices across the US and Canada are all over the board with these items. It all depends on the location of the Central Office and how many groups they have in their area. Most Central Offices have paid workers, a great deal of them have more than one paid worker, especially if the office is located within a larger city. There was also discussion on educating groups and individuals on Tradition Eight.

Friday 2:25pm-3:25pm

Workshop 3A: Coordination with General Service-District & Area Committees

This workshop spoke mostly about educating the groups and individuals that General Service, District & Area Committees are *separate* from Intergroups/Central Offices. Many people think that it is all one. Although many offices have good communication with the service structure of General Service, some do not and information easily gets lost in translation.

Friday 3:45pm-4:45pm

Workshop 4A: Twelve Step Activities-Twelve Traditions-Twelve Concepts

This workshop talked about informing the groups about the Traditions and Concepts. It was suggested that at the beginning of every Business Meeting read the Tradition/Concept for the month and read the checklists that correspond with that Tradition/Concept. It was also said that “politics” poison newcomers. To try to educate more than anything, to pass on the knowledge of the Traditions/Concepts because any issue that arises within

the group the answers can be found within the Traditions/Concepts.

Friday 7:30pm-9:30pm

AAWS (AA World Services) Presentation

There are 19 employees in the publishing department at AAWS. These 19 employees do the work of 45 people. Coming in 2018: New pamphlet cover designs!!! The Big Book is in 70 languages and counting. Coming soon is the 12x12 in Arabic! The most recent translation of the Big Book is in Punjabi. There are 12 GSO (General Service Office) employees, all of them are recovered alcoholics. New poster boards coming in 2018: I am Responsible, Declaration of Unity, A.A. Preamble.

Saturday 11:30am-12:00pm

ICOAA (Intergroup/Central Office/AAWS/AAGV) Seminar Website Presentation

There is a separate website for the Intergroups special workers to go on to to find out information on the next seminar, etc. It has now been set up for us to share experience, questions, etc.

Saturday 1:30pm-4:00pm

Business Meeting

There were 117 individuals registered for this seminar, 121 individuals showed up and 35 of those were new to the seminar. The 2018 ICOAA Seminar will be held in Montreal, Canada. Area 87 Service Office of Montreal will be hosting. The 2019 ICOAA Seminar will be held here in PHOENIX!!! Yes, you heard that right!!! The East Valley Intergroup will be hosting.

Please remind groups to buy literature & chips from SRI office to help support your local AA Intergroup so that we can keep the hand of A.A. there for all who need it.

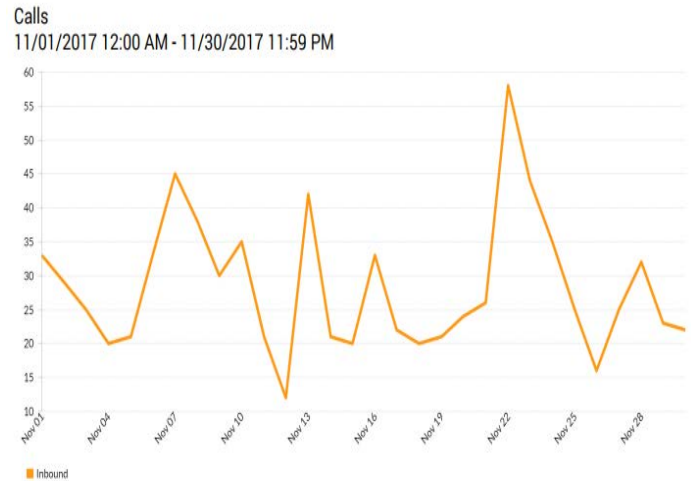
