She completely changed the menu. The liquor had to go

My head was buzzing from the quick drink I had snuck from the bar, and now I needed to check the kitchen and make sure the cooks had what they needed for the night. My night cook was someone I had worked with a few times over the years and she was always a joy to be around. That night she looked me in the eyes and said, "You don't have to live like this." She caught me off guard, and when I realized what she had said, I started to give her a long list of excuses as to why I drank so much. "You would drink too, if you had the problems I have," I told her. She giggled and went on about her work.

Three years later, I had become a stay-at-home mom, with nothing but time on my hands and plenty of booze to pass the time. My oldest daughter had recently married and I was about to become a grandma for the first time. This was an exciting time. But it was also scary. My drinking had escalated to the point where I needed alcohol to start my day; then I would drink until I passed out or ran out of liquor. Most of the time I would not allow myself to run out of alcohol, as I knew I would need some to get going the next day.

For the most part, my life was complete. I had children and a grandchild on the way. My husband was a police officer who worked long hours and served as a volunteer for the sheriff's department where we lived. We had a house and some land out in the country, and that was fine with me. I never had to be around people. I never wanted anyone to see me for who I really was. I was a mess. My mental and emotional state started to spiral out of control and I spent many days and nights crying in my beer, wondering why I was not happy. I knew my life was unmanageable. It was falling apart, but I didn't know why.

One night in March of 1998, I had been drinking and was lonely, so I had my neighbor over for a visit. She was a kind woman who didn't drink, but she was my best and only friend. I tried so hard that night to get her to drink

with me, but she wouldn't. After she went home, I got very lonely and depressed.

That night I called my sister and told her I needed help, that I was losing my mind. She came out to my house and between her and my girls, they dumped out all the booze they could find. Of course this upset me. I did not think I had a drinking problem; I just knew how to drink a lot. I kept telling them that what I needed was to get help for my mental state.

But at some point that night, I remember asking God to help me. Within 24 hours my sister told me, "Get ready. I'm taking you to a place for help." I didn't know it was a detox facility, all I knew was that I was finally getting help.

After arriving at the detox, I was introduced to AA. The volunteer handed me literature and told me to read it every chance I got. Shortly after getting settled, I went to my first AA meeting. I cried the whole time and could not understand why these people were so happy. It was a few days before I could lift my head and hear what was being said.

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I started to hear people talking about me. But how was that possible? They didn't know me; I had never seen them before. However, as I listened to the shares in the room I soon began to see that I just might be in the right place to get help. A few days later, I began to experience my first "pink cloud."

I stayed in that facility for 14 days. I was so ready to go home and live life sober. I began to think about my cook and what she said to me that night years before. It was like a lightbulb going on in my head. I knew then she had been trying to Twelfth Step me.

After arriving home, I quickly began finding all the AA halls in my area, and I didn't stop searching for my friend. I did find her, pretty quickly. That cook became my sponsor, and to this day, 17 years later, she's still my sponsor.

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity.

✓ Checklist

1. Am I in my group a healing, mending, integrating person, or am I divisive? What about gossip and taking other members' inventories?
2. Am I a peacemaker? Or do I, with pious pretexts such as "just for the sake of discussion," plunge into argument?
3. Am I gentle with those who rub me the wrong way, or am I abrasive?
4. Do I make competitive AA remarks, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in another?
5. Do I put down some AA activities as if I were superior for not participating in this or that aspect of AA?
6. Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support, in every way I can, AA as a whole, or just the parts I understand and approve of?

7. Am I as considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me?
8. Do I spout platitudes about love while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles with hostility?
9. Do I go to enough AA meetings or read enough AA literature to really keep in touch?
10. Do I share with AA all of me, the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving the help of fellowship?

Tradition One

We stay whole or AA dies. We must keep with our single of purpose. Remember that there is no "I" in team. We are members of Alcoholics Anonymous, we must not stay individuals at the group level or we will wither and die. We must resist the idea that we can climb to the top of the throne. The AA group must conform to the principles of recovery. Everything that we do or don't at the group or individual level has a consequence. We may never recognize these consequences of our actions ever in Alcoholics Anonymous lifetime let alone our own as an AA'er.

The AA'er learns that the clamor of desires and ambitions within him must be silenced whenever this could damage the group. We must at all cost keep these rooms open and safe without personal desires for the alcoholic we have not yet met or that is looking to find his place back amongst us. For the group to even exist we all must freely give of ourselves and to do without hesitation. Ask what you can do for the group to carry the message to those that still suffer. Be a vessel of the light and universe; that some of us chose to call God, and not of our own compulsions of the heart. Remember the highest position in Alcoholics Anonymous is SERVENT.

4. Where do we fit in the upside-down triangle of A.A.?
5. Are we willing to do what it takes to insure that our democracy of world service will work under all conditions?

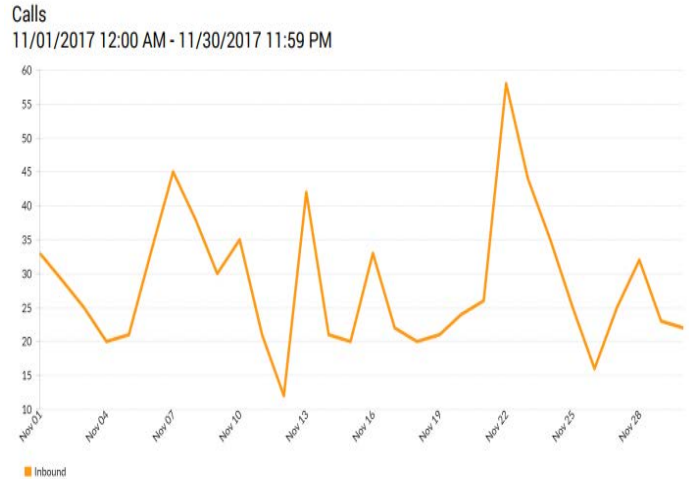

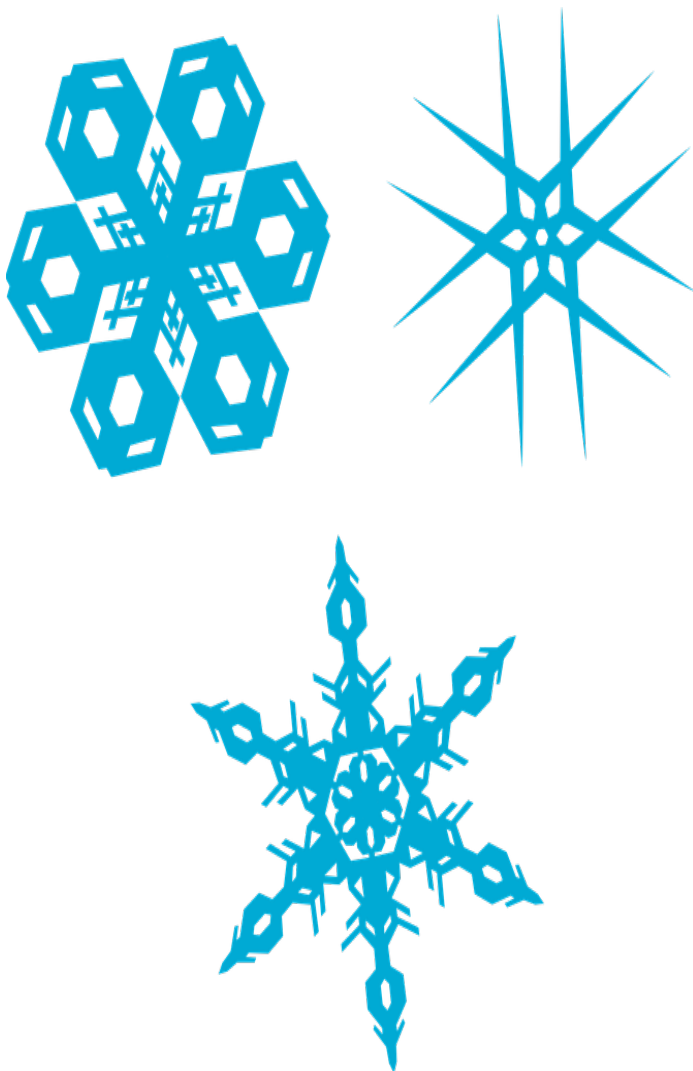

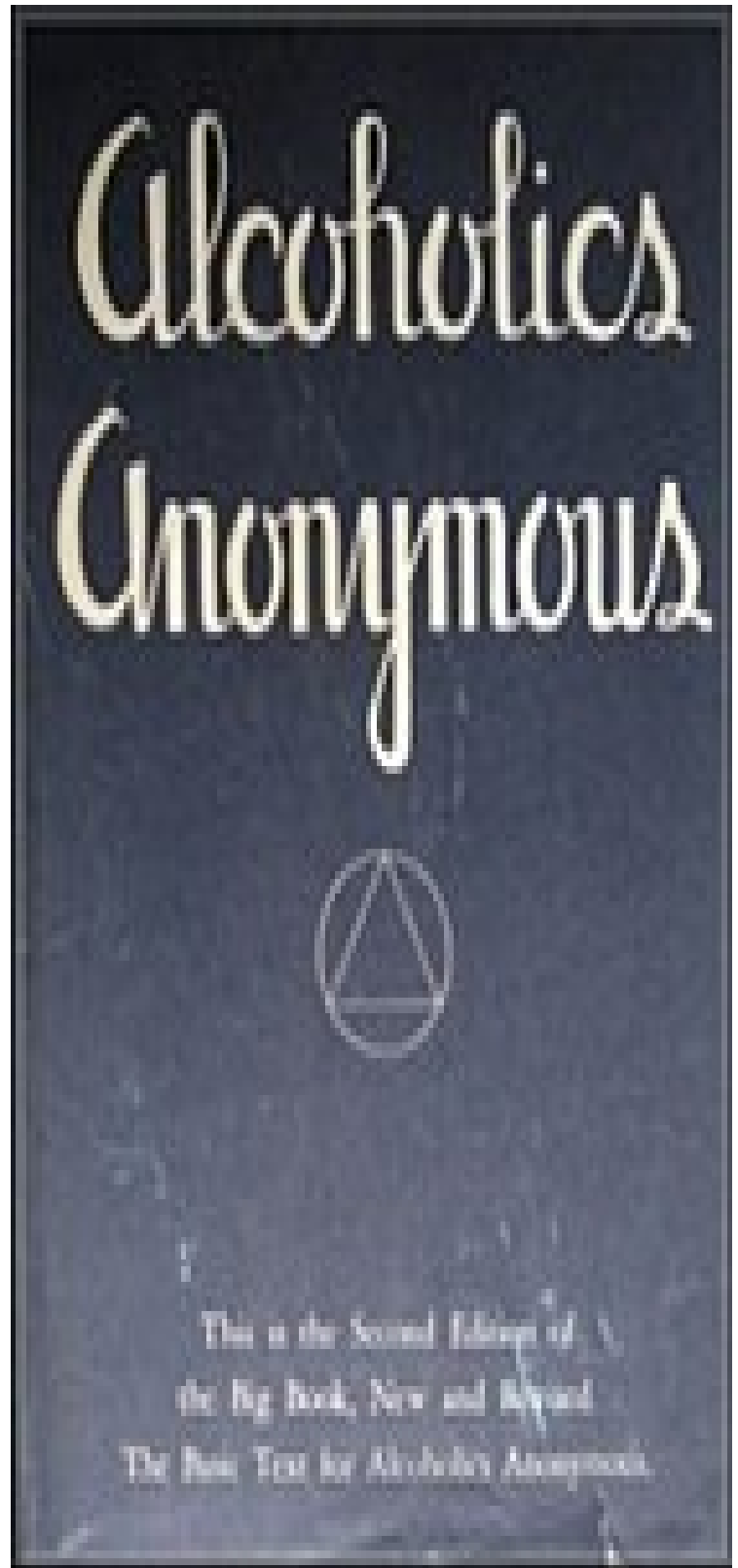
