The Road to Mental Freedom

Understanding Steps Six and Seven

Since the day I entered the program, I have had an insatiable appetite for learning all I could about the disease of alcoholism and having completed a very thorough fourth and fifth steps, and examining my motives for everything I did, in steps sixth and seven, it occurred to me that most of my problems in life involved my interfacing with, “*Those Other People*.” As I got further into the steps and started to process each and every one of these interactions, it became apparent to me that the basic cause of my discontent was, *low self-esteem* and that, until I resolved that, there would be very little *peace of mind*. I had to get right with everyone. They say that *understanding is the key to right living*, and I read just about anything I can get my hands on, about these issues, that reinforce the principles we learn in the A.A. program such as; Emmet Fox’s Sermon on The Mount, and others including, Scott Peck’s, *The Road Less Traveled*, *The Spirituality of Imperfection*, *Desiderata*, (the poem) and the like. This kind of reference material helps me to get a better perspective on how to reduce the obstacles that stand in the way of my ability to solve these problems. I have to be willing to get right with “every human being I know” as suggested in step eight. (12X12) Scott Peck describes the word *Love* as: *Caring for and nurturing another person’s soul*. I now look at Love as a verb and not a noun. You can love someone that doesn’t love you back when you use this definition and as the result, I truly wish the best for every human being I know and offer help and guidance when I can. I become their best advocate. If I want to heal, I must look deeper and try to *understand that other person* and be strong enough to, first, *reign in my ego*, then to realize that the other person may be reacting to *my adversarial position*. Finding ways of removing my own judgmental attitudes opens the door to love and compassion. Today, I can love everyone by simply giving them the respect and acceptance that I would want for myself. After doing my best to adopt this plan of action over the years, I can only say that nothing that I have ever done, with respect to

Those Other People, has been more rewarding than this approach. I have, to the best of my understanding, stopped judging others by their outside behavior and *have the strength to look deeper*. When I do that, I usually find a person, not too different from myself, trying to protect himself from his fears, and I just can’t bring myself to pile on and compound his pain. My heart goes out to him and I don’t have to deal with regrets later on. My ego is neutralized as I come to understand his troubles. The greatest gift I receive from all of this is that, as I apply this to all of *Those Other People*, I seem to allow myself the same latitude without even expecting it since at one time, I was *That Other Person*. *Self-forgiveness and peace of mind* seems to be the natural result of my efforts. I can accept everyone just as they are and not mess with God’s work.



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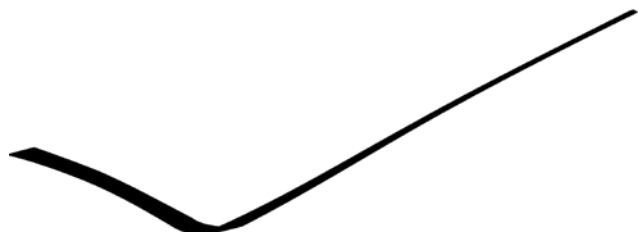

TRADITION CHECKLIST

5. Some alcoholics will stay around AA only if we have a TV and card room. If this is what is required to carry the message to them, should we have these facilities?



Tradition Six

Remember this is just my opinion and no way represents Alcoholic Anonymous.

At one time A.A. felt it was within our best interest and felt duty-bound to throw its weight behind any good cause. For A.A. found a solution for the problem drinker, maybe if the whole world acted like us we wouldn't have these problems. This caused several issues; firstly the newcomer would suffer if A.A. endorses any outside business or, such, that newcomer may have to wait while

A.A. finished its more important tasks. Secondly, the singleness of purpose would be so watered down that we as a whole may forget that we are here to fix drunks and not to open up businesses. Thirdly, once affiliated at the either the group or individual level, that said affiliation would start to represent A.A., and that said affiliation, while not A.A. would be looked at as A.A. For outside agencies dealing with Alcoholism our policy is to "cooperate" and not "affiliate".

Concept Six Checklist

Concept Six: *The Conference recognizes that the chief initiative and active responsibility in most world service matters should be exercised by the trustee members of the Conference acting as the General Service Board.*

1. Are we familiar with how our General Service Board (G.S.B.) Class A and Class B trustees serve A.A.? Are we familiar with how our other trusted servants serve A.A.?
2. Are we clear about the terms, "chief initiative" and "active responsibility"? Can we see a direct link to our home group?

“On behalf of A.A. as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principal responsibility for the maintenance of our world services, and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the Conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the Conference when they act among themselves as the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous.”

The General Service Conference must delegate administrative authority to the General Service Board of Trustees. The trustees have the legal and practical responsibility for the operation of A.A. World Services performs very important task for the Fellowship as a whole. They handle much of the business affairs of AA therefore it makes good business sense to grant them the necessary administrative authority to do this effectively.

What is Alcoholics Anonymous Primary Purpose?

I don't speak for Alcoholics Anonymous as a whole, I am just a member in good standings. I can only speak of my experiences in the past decade that in itself is a miracle, God's Grace, undeserved mercy.

When I came into the rooms almost ten years ago there was a buzz. A buzz like no other. I got involved early on in Area service, I was the GSR of my home group. I quickly learned about the Traditions and what Bill W. wanted them stand for. I must admit I was on fire and some say I still am, which is not a bad thing if you have compassion for a program that saved one's life, as it did mine.

Recovery, unity, and service are the three legacies of our fellowship. Once we have recovered from a hopeless state of mind and body as stated on the title page of the Big Book, we then carry this message to the alcoholic that still suffers. We continue to be of service in whatever

capacity we are able to contribute. Rarely, have I seen a person go back out if they were doing these three things; Trust God, Clean House and Help others. This is very vital for A.A.'s existence. You hear the same thing all the time “only ten percent of the people in AA, are doing ninety percent of the work.” I was brought to my attention by Our Area Delegate that “one hundred percent of the people in service of AA, are doing one hundred percent of the work.” Those that can be of service usually do, and the “meeting makers” do just that, they make meetings.

Putting this all together Bill W. came up with the 12 Traditions for a reason, to ensure that Alcoholics Anonymous would not fall to the waste side like the Washingtonians did. This was a Temperance Society founded by six alcoholics on April 2, 1840. The only problem with this movement was that anyone could join, alcoholic or non-alcoholic were welcome. The Washingtonians had hospitals that engaged in the treatment of alcoholism by today's medicine and social standards. Unlike the AA's Anonymity, the Washingtonians held parades, a president, and fees. D.P., Ogden, UT. (February, 1971), Washingtonian Retrieved from: aagrapevine.org. This is a great read for those looking to further their knowledge of the Washingtonians.

Bill, knowing this, he did not want to see Alcoholics Anonymous follow the same destructive path as the Temperance. Bill stated in the Preamble, Tradition Five, ensuring that we carry the message to the Alcoholic, and only the alcoholic that suffers.

This leads me to the point that I see all too often, and that is letting a person with an outside issue speak at AA meetings. This is a violation of Tradition Five which states: “Each Alcoholics Anonymous group ought to be a spiritual entity *having but one primary purpose* – that of carrying its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.” Bill W., (1953), Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, Tradition Five, p. 190 para.1, retrieved from AA World Services, Inc.

How are we to carry our message to those that cannot relate to their problems with alcohol? Tradition Ten reminds us that we have no opinion on outside issues.

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What is an “*outside issue?*” Anything other than Alcoholism. After looking at the lists of different twelve step programs, if you can think of it there is a program for it. Having said that, as the responsible members of Alcoholics Anonymous is in our best interest to point them to a program that best suits their needs. I just hope and pray that those that are suffering from whatever they are going through find/get the help they need to become productive members of society.

I have seen the “real alcoholic” come into the rooms, hear someone talk about their outside issues and that person is never seen or heard from again. That’s not what the responsible alcoholic does, “*I am responsible when anyone anywhere reaches out for help I want the hand of AA to always be there, and for that I am responsible.*”

Remember walking in to your first AA meeting, alone, scared, afraid, the fear of not fitting in? Well if you are like this alcoholic, someone came up to you and asked “are you new?” Here’s a cup of coffee, listen to the similarities and not the differences, find someone you can relate to, and keep coming back. Just a simple sentence, can save a person’s life. “We are people that would not normally not mix, but we have one thing in common and that is the disease of alcoholism, we cannot keep it if we don’t give it away. But we can only share our experience to the things we have experienced. Too many people try sharing things they think they know and have no experience, we are doing other members a disservice when we do this to our fellow man, and that disservice also includes pointing others in the right direction.

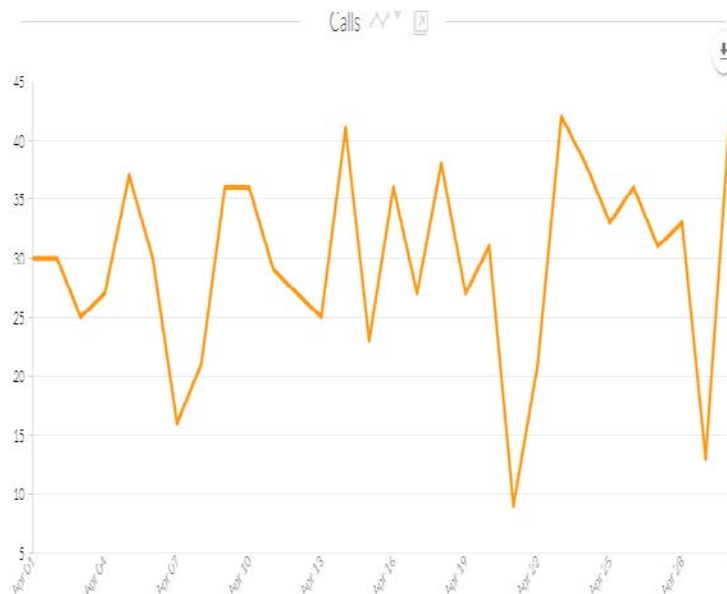

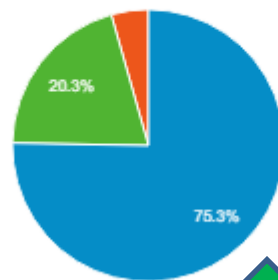

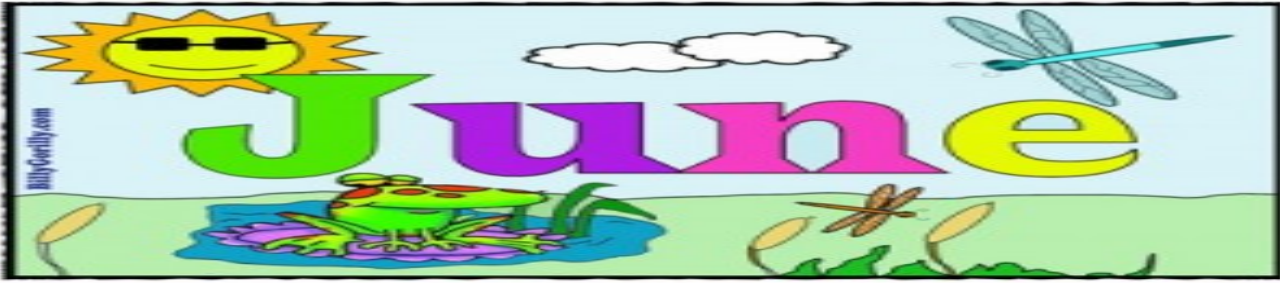
