Fifth Step Revelations

In Step Five, my sponsor focused the light of truth onto the unrealized driving forces of **selfishness, dishonesty, resentment and fear**. Step Four had provided tools to 'face and be rid of' these grosser handicaps . . . but still, countless other destructive little demons, of the grosser variety, lurked in some dark dank space deep inside. They freely frolicked in this invisible environment, happily protected from the Sunlight-Of-The-Spirit. It was as though they were protected under a very opaque **umbrella**, weaved with the fabric the grosser handicaps of **selfishness, dishonest, resentment and fear**.

My sponsor informed me that Step Five was to include a *detailed* revelation of these particular grosser defects of character and shortcomings. Those little demons and devils of conceit, jealousy, carelessness, intolerance, ill temper, and all the rest of it were about to be exposed -- not only to my sponsor, but to GOD! Although my sponsor had not the power to close that umbrella, the Big Book tells me that God could and would if he were sought! (*Those little fiends must have been trembling down there!*). The sunlight of the Spirit was about to shine on those little fiends – for they cannot survive in the sunlight of God's Truth, because **an alcoholic cannot drink on the truth!**

The Fifth Step promises (p. 75) tell us that we now begin to have a spiritual experience. Well, the realization that God is soon-to-remove the very things that blocked me from seeing and acting on the truth-in-drink indeed speaks to a radical inner transformation! I believe the main goal of this vital step is to allow us (me) to realize exactly what dominant inner forces have blocking the truth-in-drink; only then will I know exactly what imperfections to ask God to remove in Steps Six and Seven.

It was very important that I acted before my mind decided to remember only what it wanted to remember. I believe that the Big Book *timetable* is very important here! We are told to do Step Four '*at once,*' Step Five at '*First opportunity,*' review for a short period

and '*then*' (not later) do Step Six, go right into Step Seven '*when ready.*' Steps Five, Six and Seven are often referred to as the 'same day steps.'

I am very happy that my sponsor, Carl, helped me *close that umbrella* via the Big Book directions. I haven't had a drink of booze since! ~~ Bob S., Richmond, IN



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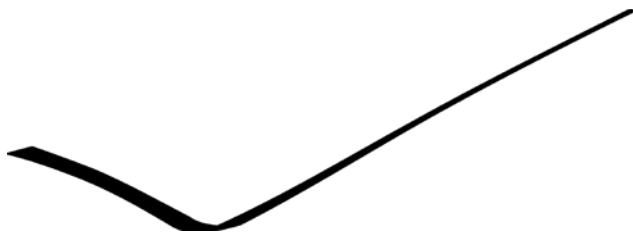

TRADITION CHECKLIST

Tradition Five: *Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.*

1. Do I ever cop out by saying, “I’m not a group, so this or that Tradition doesn’t apply to me”?
2. Am I willing to explain firmly to a newcomer the limitations of AA help, even if he gets mad at me for not giving him a loan?
3. Have I today imposed on any AA member for a special favor or consideration simply because I am a fellow alcoholic?
4. Am I willing to twelfth-step the next newcomer without regard to who or what is in it for me?
5. Do I help my group in every way I can to fulfill our primary purpose?
6. Do I remember that AA old-timers, too, can be alcoholics who still suffer? Do I try both to help them and to learn from them?



Tradition Five

“Each group has but one primary purpose- to carry its message to the alcoholic who still Suffers”

This is my own opinion and in no way reflects AA as a whole.

This Tradition tells us that we are to stick the problem drinker that wants to find the way out, and knows of no way out other than his own demise. We inform that we have found a path to recovery - the way out, from a hopeless state of mind and the disease of Alcoholism, that will lead to a sober lifestyle one day at a time if you want it bad enough. Carrying the message is the lifeblood of our fellowship and the preservation of this tradition is to put aside our self-seeking desires of the

heart when someone reaches out for help. The way out for the alcoholic requires no specific learning or skill set, except that we must freely give what was freely given to us. We must do this to keep this special precious gift of sobriety or we may find ourselves back amongst insanity. While many among us may be professionals, a majority of us are not and we need to keep to the message of recovery from alcoholism. The most important decision I make every day upon waking is not to drink and what path am I going to walk to accomplish this. Remember the highest position ever in Alcoholic Anonymous is servant.

CONCEPT CHECKLIST

Concept Five: *Throughout our structure, a traditional “Right of Appeal” ought to prevail, so that minority opinion will be heard and personal grievances receive careful consideration.*

1. Do we encourage the minority opinion, the “Right of Appeal,” to be heard at our home group, district committee meetings, area assemblies and the Conference?
2. What does our group accept as “substantial unanimity”?
3. Has our group experienced the “tyranny of the majority” or the “tyranny of the minority”?
4. Does our group understand the importance of all points of view being heard before a vote is taken?



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May - Concept 5

"Throughout our world services structure, a traditional "Right of Appeal" ought to prevail, thus assuring us that minority opinion will be heard and that petitions for the redress of personal grievances will be carefully considered."

This concept focuses on the "Right of Appeal." During a vote, even if there is a "substantial unanimity" the minority opinion has a right to be heard and their grievances considered. There are times where the minority opinion is so compelling that the conference delegates change their positions and votes. For example, commonly, a minority opinion is based on the wording of the original motion. Voicing this then causing that motion to fail and allowing for the re-worded motion to pass.

Solution for ALL

A sponsee and I spent a lovely evening together and right before we went our separate ways, she asked me, "what do you think the -ism is?"

Well, of course, there are short and snappy answers to that like, 'Incredibly short memory', 'I, self, me' or 'the alcohol is in the bottle, the ism is in me'. And while these are undoubtedly true, I knew that wasn't what Liz was really asking. The bigger question is, What is it about my alcoholISM that sets me apart from my fellows? Or to put it another way, Where does my human condition end and my alcoholism begin?

Alcoholics don't hold the monopoly on fear, on over reaction when they're hungry, on drama, on control, on anger, on pain, on resentment. Disney got it right when they wrote the song with the lyric, 'people make bad choices when they're mad or scared or stressed'. They weren't singing that lesson only for 6 year old potential alcoholics. Alcoholics are unquestionably extreme in their responses but these are essentially human concerns.

So I decided to ask around. Being in AA for a little while has taught me to ask others for their ideas and come up with the right one for me.

My friend with 30+ years of sobriety had an immediate answer. 'Here's a feeling, what can I use to change it? I don't care, even if it kills me'. As we talked around it a bit more, it became clear that that wasn't enough. The answer he came up with, that he was finally happy with was, 'I am the problem, the solution is Abandon yourself to God as you understand it'.

Another friend with 24 years spoke of having a thinking and living problem. He 'drank at the crazy because I didn't have another solution'. Until he did.

A friend with 6 years spoke of knowing that she could not drink safely and that her thinking around alcohol was skewed and was therefore, something she needed help with and a solution for.

I spoke with my own sponsor, a woman of integrity and grit with 38 years this week and in the course of our conversation, my own answer emerged. Funny how that happens. We talked about the thinking, the living, the 'normal' human issues, the alcohol, the physical, the emotional and the spiritual issues. And finally, it became so clear. The question itself isn't important. It simply doesn't matter where my human condition ends and my alcoholISM begins. It couldn't matter less what sets me apart from my fellows.

The only real, salient point is this: I HAVE A SOLUTION. And I realised that everyone I asked used the word 'solution' in their replies. Bill tells us in his story that his friend promised he would have the elements of a way of living which answered all his problems (Alcoholics Anonymous, p. 13). Not his alcoholic or his human ones but ALL of them. Belief in the power of God, PLUS enough willingness, honesty and humility to establish and maintain the new order of things, were the essential ingredients (Alcoholics Anonymous, p. 13-14). And with that, came the peace that Bill also tells us about. I don't need to know why I am an alcoholic, I need to know that I am an alcoholic. I don't need to separate myself from my human fellows, normal or not. We are told in the very first paragraph of the Forward to the very First Edition of the Big Book that, 'besides we are sure that our way of living has its advantages for all'. The only thing I need to know is the solution that works for me for all my problems. And the only thing I have to do is to share it by being a living example, so that victory over my

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difficulties may bear witness to those I would help, of my Higher Power's power, love and way of life.

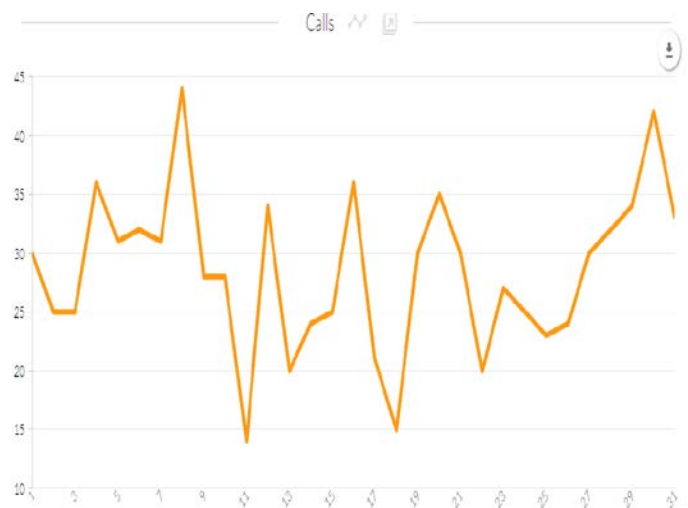

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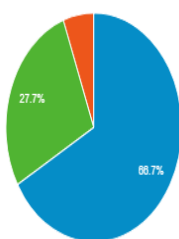

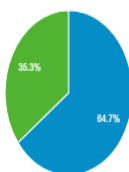
Visits by Traffic Type

Alcoholics with additional barriers keeping them from receiving the A.A. message.

1. **Which added barrier do we get the most calls for? *Deaf / Hard of Hearing**
2. **Why?** The Deaf alcoholic needs American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters to help them be a part of A.A. meetings. ASL interpreters cost \$ 60 hr. We have only a couple of ASL signers, in the program, willing to be of service on a limited bases. Currently, in Maricopa Cty., there are NO specific meetings for Deaf alcoholic only. If you are aware of any meetings for the deaf in Maricopa Cty. - please contact us at the # below.
3. **How is this committee trying to help the Deaf alcoholic?** Without specific meetings we are referring calls from a deaf alcoholic to <http://aa-intergroup.org/> for online meetings. This is merely a temporary solution!!! On-line meeting do not give an opportunity for sponsorship; or developing local friendship at meetings. *Our real goal is to establish meetings in central locations,

4. *seeking ways to obtain funds for ASL signers allowing these alcoholics the feeling of being welcome. We hope to have donation cans at local round-ups to help pay for ASL signers (2 are needed for each speaker meeting).
5. **How can Home Groups help the “Hard of Hearing” alcoholic?** Many of us in A.A. are getting older and/or are beginning to develop hearing challenges making it difficult to hear and understand a speaker from a distance, or even meetings with microphones can be an issue. We suggest home group allow them to sit close to the speaker so it is easier to understand!
6. If you know of a deaf alcoholic or have suggestions on how to fund ASL signers: Or would like to be a part of the committee!
