## SALT RIVER INTERGROUP

**“Came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.”**

The Big Book infers that a vital spiritual experience is necessary for alcoholics to face and be rid of the obsession to drink. (p. 27) Yet, paradoxically, we are told that belief in God was not necessary to accomplish this miracle—we need only become willing to believe. (p. 46) Indeed, I found that it wasn't necessary to define God before doing the Twelve Steps, but I began to see the result of my willingness to believe several months afterward. I experienced a release from that deadly mental obsession that had plagued me for nearly thirty years! My willingness to believe came **before** doing the Twelve Steps, but my belief came **afterwards**. The evidence was indisputable—I had been released! I had experienced a *“personality change sufficient to recover from alcoholism.”* I had been in AA for about a year before the release took place (The Big Book uses the word recovered), so in AA Program language I had *had* a spiritual awakening (slow) rather than a spiritual experience (sudden) as mentioned in Appendix II. (p. 567)

The Big Book does **not** say that I must understand God, but it speaks of: *“God as we understood Him,”* in Steps 3 and 11. This simply means that we each may entertain our different views of a higher power. Although I may not understand God, I can see His **results**, i.e.: We have over two million sober alcoholics in AA and most all of us claim that God saved them from an alcoholic pit. (Including me!)

Reverend Sam Shoemaker, Bill Wilson's Oxford Group mentor, stated: *“Step two is not theological, it is evidential.”* The evidence is around the AA tables!

As I study the Big Book, I realize that certain words are used in a special and technical context not to be found in dictionaries. One of these words is “sanity.” Sanity, in Big Book speak, is when an alcoholic can see and act on the truth in the matter of drink. Alcoholic insanity is when they cannot. Two examples: **Alcoholic insanity:** Jim pouring whisky into milk: *“plain insanity”* (p. 37) **Alcoholic Sanity:** Fitz Mayo who *“couldn't drink even if he would.”* (p. 57)

Someone wrote: *“The better I understand God, the less I know God.”* Came to believe is a *decision of the heart*, rather than of a *conclusion of the mind.*”

Tradition 2: For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority - a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern.

- Do I criticize or do I trust and support my group officers, AA committees, and office workers? Newcomers? Old-timers?
- Am I absolutely trustworthy, even in secret, with AA Twelfth Step jobs or other AA responsibilities?
- Do I look for credit in my AA jobs, praise for my AA ideas?
- Do I have to save face in group discussion, or can I yield in good spirit to the group conscience and work cheerfully along with it?
- Although I have been sober a few years, am I still willing to serve my turn at AA chores?
- In group discussions, do I sound off about matters on which I have no experience and little knowledge?



## Concept Two

### CONCEPT II

When, in 1955, the A.A. groups confirmed the permanent charter for their General Service Conference, they thereby delegated to the Conference complete authority for the active maintenance of world services and thereby made the Conference - except for any change in the Twelve Traditions or in Article 12 of the Conference Charter - the actual voice and the effective conscience for our whole Society.

If there is one operative word about Concept II, it is surely "Delegation". Our founders learned early on, that they alone, could Not possibly handle all the responsibilities of " Carrying the Message" Worldwide. With it's funding, financial management, Public relations, production of Literature, and the daily business of the Service office in New York City. There were simply not enough hours in a Day. And they were mortal men. Dr. Bobs declining Health emphasized this fact clearly.

So, they enlisted the help of many non-alcoholic friends, and Early members, to form a "Trusteeship", of sorts, to delegate to these trusted Servants, both paid, and volunteers, to carry out this Mission.

When these Trustees continued to look to Bob and Bill for advice and guidance, our Founders assumed positions as Advisers. But it soon became evident that Leadership should be transferred, (delegated) to A.A. Groups as a whole. But how then, would the Group Conscience of local Fellowships be shared with, and therefore have power to influence and effect changes, at a Worldwide Level ? What a great question ....

The answer became the "Upside down Triangle" concept. As a business or Corporate Model, it should, in theory, NEVER work. And yet, for sixty-five years, and counting, it has proven itself quite successful for AA, as a whole.

Individual groups must stay focused on our Primary purpose, to "Carry the message to the Alcoholic, that still suffers". In order to do that, to the best of their collective abilities, they appoint a trusted G.S.R. from their ranks. The G.S.R. meets regularly, in Area Assemblies. Every April, delegates from the 91 areas in the U.S. and Canada meet with Trustees of the General Services Board, the staff of General Service Office, and the A.A. Grapevine service workers.

Thus, the General Service Conference of A.A. is " The actual voice and effective conscience of our whole Society, in it's World Affairs".

From the Concept checklist, I have chosen the question " Do we have an understanding of the General Service Conference" ?

## Concept Two Checklist

Concept II: The General Service Conference of A.A. has become, for nearly every practical purpose, the active voice and the effective conscience of our whole Society in its world affairs.

- Do we have an understanding of the history of the General Service Conference (the "Conference")
- What is a Conference Advisory Action? Does our home group's G.S.R., D.C.M., area delegate report back to the group on the highlights of the Conference and Conference Advisory Actions?
- Is our group meeting its wider Seventh Tradition responsibilities?

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### **Came to believe... what exactly??**

I've taken on a new service commitment. Those of you who know me can stop rolling your eyes now. It is chairing a Big Book Step Study for 12 weeks (1 week for each step, clever I thought). The format of the meeting is that someone speaks/shares on the step, using the Big Book as a reference and then tickets are called to share back. We are at Step 7 this week and I've come to understand that I have been given a very great gift. I have been able to have a whole, new experience of the steps! Fancy that?!

As it's Feb and the 2<sup>nd</sup> month, I thought I might share my experience, strength and hope of Step 2 that day. Of course the Step was read: Came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity. What followed the speaker's share was a meeting dominated by the G word, sometimes interspersed with the HP phrase. People's initial beliefs, non beliefs, beliefs now, faith, concept of, design of, sponsor's recommendation thereof, fears of believing, fears of not believing, fear of drinking if not believing. You get the picture and you've probably been to the meeting. Maybe you have a tee shirt.

A strange thing occurred to me during the ebb and flow. One of those 'aha' moments. What if I set aside the 'power greater than ourselves' part, just for a minute. Came to believe that we could be restored to sanity. Hmm. What if it was more about believing I could be restored to sanity than who was going to do it for me? Or just as important. In order for that to happen, I would have to believe I needed sanity to be restored in the first place, and that required believing that I was

insane....or at the very least, a bit dotty. Or perhaps very sick. As my beloved first sponsor used to regularly say, "it's because you're mentally ill". And I certainly was...very. Because it's mental, I cannot think my way out of it. It took a very long time for me to realize just how sick I was. That understanding allowed me to have great compassion for those like me.

Now I get that the need for a power greater than myself or my alcoholism, is because without it I'll need to fill the hole and since I can't do it externally or by myself, I'll just drink again. And for me, to drink is to die. I also understand that the drink is really the manifestation of a solution to the disease in my head and a decade and more on from my first meeting, I know it is my emotional sobriety that tends to my physical sobriety. In the beginning it was the other way round, how could it be otherwise? I had to put the drink down before I could begin to understand WHY I drank. Now it is awareness and caring for/tending to my mental state that ensures my physical sobriety. Applying the principles of the steps to my life, getting perspective and help from my fellows, remembering where I was and remaining in awe of where I am now, being grateful for the opportunity afforded to me in another day. These are some manifestations of the solution I use now to keep me restored to sanity....or at the very least, a semblance thereof. This is my higher power at work in my life. Through you, and for that, I am profoundly grateful. Terry L.
