Where is the Hamburger?

The Real Problem Lies Between Our Ears

The disease of alcoholism is difficult to understand in a world that looks at everything in a logical way. Many of the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, (A.A.) spend years struggling to find the answers to this complicated malady. Our behavior while drinking often becomes the focus of our attempt to deal with this problem. It is logical to think that a person can just quit drinking when it starts to become a problem, and we know that this kind of logic does not work on alcoholism, but why not? If you remove the alcohol from the equation, his problems should diminish and things should return to normal, right? That seems logical but the real problem lies between our ears.

I was listening to a local sportscaster on the radio one day talking about his sparse college days when he was cramming for exams and working long into the night. He got hungry and ran out to the market to pick up something he could heat up for a quick meal. He purchased a box of Hamburger Helper, ran back to the dorm, opened the package, and the first thing out of his mouth was, "Where's the hamburger"? He was not aware that there is no hamburger in Hamburger Helper. All the ingredients were there and all he needed to do was to add the hamburger; then he would have a meal.

That scenario is like the way I have come to understand the disease of alcoholism. Many of us may have been alcoholics long before we ever took our first drink. All the ingredients of alcoholism were there, and all we needed to do was to add the alcohol; then, we had a meal. The ingredients for alcoholism are not all that obvious. They are often intangible; however, The Big Book and the 12&12 have addressed most of them. They are referred to as

spiritual maladies, fears, immaturity, grandiosity, selfishness, dishonesty, guilt, shame etc. These things, and many other subtler issues, are the root cause of our inability to function without the use of alcohol (or other mind-altering drugs). The term "mind altering" is a clue to where the trouble starts. I believe that alcohol worked temporarily by the relief it gave me as it masked all those irrational fears that we alcoholics experience and the peace of mind we experienced midway through our second drink. (So, to speak) Alcoholism is a progressive disease and it requires us to increase our intake to keep up with that progression until we are out of control, and try as we might, we can never regain that control. That is the delusion that all alcoholics are faced with, and I am not sure that any of us can pick the day that we can abandon that delusion but when that day comes, if we remove the alcohol from the menu, but fail to address the other difficult ingredients, in a systematic way, we have little chance of experiencing a happy and successful recovery. Just knowing about them is not enough. We will need to practice the principles of Alcoholics Anonymous on every one of these destructive character traits if we are to experience the freedom of the spirit that we all seek. Our problems did not just appear, they have evolved over a long period of time, and it will take time to heal them. Patience, perseverance, unselfishness, understanding, faith, honesty; these are a few of the new ingredients that we will need to add to our plate if we plan to be around when the desert is being served. "The promises are being fulfilled among us---sometimes quickly, sometimes slowly. They will always materialize if we work for them" (BB pg. 84) HAMBURGER! WHO NEEDS IT?

Tradition Two

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority – a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern."

As I accumulated time in sobriety I began to meditate on how Tradition Two applies to me personally. When I first got sober I was not a team player (to say the least). I silently complained about who did what and how. As I became confident in my recovery I decided that my group really needed my "take charge" skills. Wrong.

Today I try to ask myself *how* as a leader *and* a trusted servant I can best contribute to my home group. The obvious (but not-always-easy) answer is "by example." Tradition Two teaches me that my leadership does not constitute authority.

In 1947, Bill W, addressing the success of AA and the need for the rapidly growing fellowship to adopt traditions, stated, "Sometimes...we may forget that we are a people who cannot exist at all, but for the grace of God. The wine of forgetfulness might make us dream that Alcoholics Anonymous was *our* success rather than *God's* will. The very malignancy which once tore us apart personally could commence to [tear us apart] as groups. False pride might lead us to controversy, to claims of power and prestige, to bickerings over property, money, and personal authority."

"We need only adapt and apply to our group those principles upon which each of us has founded his own recovery. If humility can expel the obsession to drink

alcohol, then surely humility can be our antidote for that subtle wine called success."

"The group conscience will, in the end, prove a far more infallible guide for group affairs than the decision of any individual member, however good or wise he may be."

Tradition Two reminds me to always check my motives. It tells me how to be part of a greater whole. It challenges me to focus my personal ambition on becoming closer to a loving God as He may express Himself in each activity and decision my group makes.

Tradition Two Checklist

For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority - a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern.

- Do I criticize or do I trust and support my group officers, AA committees, and office workers? Newcomers? Old-timers?
- Am I absolutely trustworthy, even in secret, with AA Twelfth Step jobs or other AA responsibilities?
- Do I look for credit in my AA jobs, praise for my AA ideas?
- Do I have to save face in group discussion, or can I yield in good spirit to the group conscience and work cheerfully along with it?
- Although I have been sober a few years, am I still willing to serve my turn at AA chores?
- In group discussions, do I sound off about matters on which I have no experience and little knowledge?



Concept Two

When, in 1955, the A.A. groups confirmed the permanent charter for their General Conference, they thereby delegated to the conference complete authority for the active maintenance of our world services and thereby made the Conference-excepting for any change in the Twelve Traditions or in Article 12 of the Conference Charter- the actual voice and the effective conscience for our whole society.

Concept II establishes the "final responsibility and ultimate authority" of the A.A. groups; but, in actual practice, how are they to manage A.A.'s service affairs? By delegation, Concept II declares.

Bill and Bob, entrusted by the early groups to get the program going and to spread the message, found nonalcoholic friends to help them. They formed a trusteeship and delegated to it the responsibility for finances, the Big Book and other literature, public information, the service office and the A.A. Grapevine. However, as the trustees constantly looked to the co-founders for advice and guidance and the groups continued to hold them accountable, it was evident that the leadership should be transferred to the A.A. groups as a whole. But if the groups were to carry on their primary purpose, they would have to delegate their leadership role to a General Service Conference. They do this by electing a General Service Representative (GSR) for each group. These G.S.R.s meet regularly in area assemblies and every two years elect a delegate from among their number. Every April, the delegates from the 93 areas (updated as of January 2023) in the U.S. and Canada meet for six

days with the trustees of the General Service Board, the staffs of the General Service Office and the A.A. Grapevine and certain other service workers. Thus, this General Service Conference of A.A. is "the actual voice and effective conscience of our whole Society in its world affairs."
