When Alcohol was Our God

After a history of drinking to excess, many people join A.A. only to feel baffled by the concept of handing one's life over to God or "a Higher Power" ("H.P." for short). For alcoholics in remission, who have lost or never had a concept of God, this may seem like a barrier to sober living -- yet it shouldn't when we think how Alcohol was ruining life before we joined A.A.

When we drank, alcohol was God. We spent almost all of our time thinking about buying the next drink and the timing for drinking -- when and where, how much time we could get away with being drunk or pretending we hadn't drunk too much. We then had to add the time we needed to sober up, which as we aged tended to be longer periods of time.

With alcohol as our boss, the drinking cycle was endless: figuring out how much money we needed for booze, sometimes passing on adequate food and other necessities. We'd plan our next bender to ease situations that then became chaos.

Other costs compounded as our illness with this sicko "God" progressed. We'd find ourselves facing judges and fines for illegal acts, in jail for drunk-driving, in bed with people we never would have chosen had we been sober, in danger, injured or in the hospital. Our children were ashamed of us. Our spouses couldn't take it again. We made empty promises.

Some "God" alcohol proved to be, demanding more money, time, health, opportunities, and energy from our relationships and careers.

Now that we've found A.A., it should be easy enough to see the A.A. group as a Higher Power: more minds over matter make it so much easier to gain new, healthy habits for dealing with the stresses of life. Working with a sponsor, going to meetings, working the Steps, working with others -- all of these can be part of what we understand our healthier "H.P." to be.

Perhaps another simple concept is to think of the inner spark of life within each of us -- the spark that pushed us to ask for help in firing that devastating boss, Alcohol. When we chose A.A., the desire to keep living proved stronger than the desire to die. (See "The Spiritual Experience, Appendix II, Page 367 in "The Big Book," and -- of course -- Step 2.)

This is how Alcoholics Anonymous was here for me and if we remember that, it is how it will be here for the next person.

Do I spout platitudes about love while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles hostility?

Do I go to enough AA meetings or read enough AA literature to really keep in touch?

Do I share with AA all of me, the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving the help of fellowship?

Concept One

The final responsibility and the ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship.

However, in 1948, there occurred an event that shook us all. It became known that Dr. Bob was suffering from a fatal illness. As nothing else could, this news drove home the hard fact that he and I were almost the sole links between our virtually unknown Trustees and the movement they served. The Trustees always had relied heavily upon Dr. Bob and me for advice. They had taken a firm grip on money expenditures, but they necessarily turned to us every time that A.A. policy questions arose. Then, too, the groups of that time did not really rely much on the Trustees for the management of their service affairs; they were still looking to Dr. Bob and me. So here was a society whose total functioning was still largely dependent upon the credit and the confidence which, for the time being, its founders happened to enjoy.

The fact had to be faced that A.A.'s founders were perishable. When Dr. Bob and I had gone, who would then advise the Trustees; who could link our lit-

tle-known Board to our thousands of groups? For the first time it was seen that only a representative conference could take the place of Dr. Bob and me. This gap simply had to be filled without delay. Such a dangerous open end in our affairs could not be tolerated. Regardless of trouble or expense, we had to call an A.A. General Service Conference and deliver our world services into its permanent keeping. It took little imagination to see that future collapse would be the certain penalty if we did not act boldly and decisively. Thus, propelled by events, we did take the necessary action. Now that the Conference is in its second decade, we find that our former fears of the troubles a Conference might involve were largely groundless. The results of the Conference have exceeded our highest expectations. It now stands proven that the A.A. groups can and will take the final responsibility for their world services. 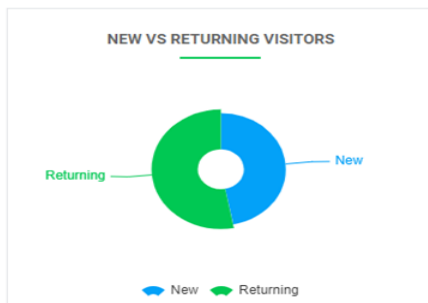
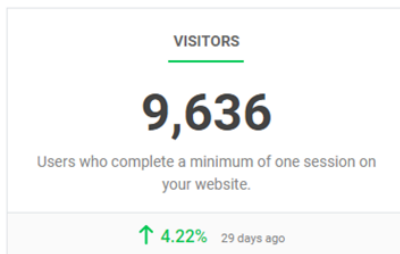
Please remind groups to buy literature & chips from SRI office to help support your local AA Intergroup so that we can keep the hand of A.A. there for all who need it.

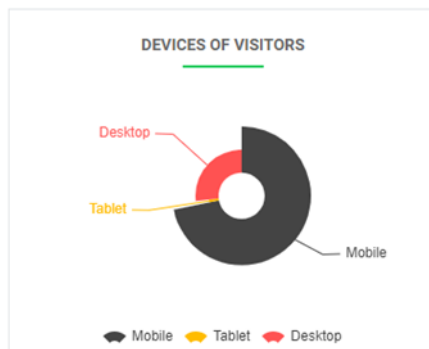

Steering Committee Member Spotlight

It's not usually me that writes the Jan edition of a Message from your Steering Committee because it's always the new Chair. Adrian kindly let me take his place as I put on my cow eyes and said, "but it's my birthday and I never get to...". Clearly, self seeking has not slipped away.

I did want to write something for my birthday month because I'm always excited about it. The way I used to get excited about my belly button birthday when I was younger, without the presents. But some things have happened since I asked to do this that have hit hard. I got sick (which I never do!) with some flu like thing that took me out for 4 and a half days and took a week beyond to fully recover. One of my dearest friends called to tell me that her husband, her best friend and the love of her life, had died. I got diagnosed with a different, fatal, progressive illness (this one also has a treatment). A very dear friend was hospitalized and couldn't seem to get any better even after 10 days in the hospital.

These are the sort of things that elicit that phrase you may have heard in the rooms, "I've had some terrible times in my sobriety". I really despise that phrase. To me it's so limiting and misses the bigger picture, the one that allows me to feel gratitude no matter what and prevents me from using any event or incident as a reason to get drunk. That bigger picture is this. I've had some really hard times IN MY LIFE. We all have. I don't know a single person, not one, alcoholic or not, that hasn't had difficult, painful, gut

wrenching times in their life. That IS life. The up, down, over, under, outside in and inside out of it. Sobriety is the way I choose to live through those things. Good and bad. And I am so bloody grateful I can. I couldn't go through before I got sober, I had to avoid or push away. I don't have a drinking problem anymore but I absolutely do still have a living life on life's terms problem.

God willing, I will have 17 years on the 11th of Jan. I really don't want to miss out on the party so I work hard to develop my spiritual life, to increase my conscious contact with my HP, to continue to use the tools that served me well in early sobriety (meetings, service, fellowship) and to seek new ones (a spiritual centre, meditation, new sponsor) to keep this teenage sobriety fresh. That does not make everything easy but it does make everything easier.

I'll finish with this. I was getting ready for the day that included a painful test for this new disease, I felt all foot stampy and "I don't want to do THIS!" and I suddenly remembered my beloved friend and the fact that she was already doing 'THIS'. Whether I want to or not isn't the issue and I have friends that will happily listen when I need a boohoo. How I show up is paramount and integral to how I live and especially to how I feel about my place in this world. Sobriety, particularly emotional sobriety, allows me to do that with some grace, dignity and humour. How are you showing up today and how has sobriety changed that for you?? And if it hasn't, could you be missing the party?
