When Alcohol was Our God

After a history of drinking to excess, many people join A.A. only to feel baffled by the concept of handing one's life over to God or "a Higher Power" ("H.P." for short). For alcoholics in remission, who have lost or never had a concept of God, this may seem like a barrier to sober living -- yet it shouldn't when we think how Alcohol was ruining life before we joined A.A.

When we drank, alcohol was God. We spent almost all of our time thinking about buying the next drink and the timing for drinking -- when and where, how much time we could get away with being drunk or pretending we hadn't drunk too much. We then had to add the time we needed to sober up, which as we aged tended to be longer periods of time.

With alcohol as our boss, the drinking cycle was endless: figuring out how much money we needed for booze, sometimes passing on adequate food and other necessities. We'd plan our next bender to ease situations that then became chaos.

Other costs compounded as our illness with this sicko "God" progressed. We'd find ourselves facing judges and fines for illegal acts, in jail for drunk-driving, in bed with people we never would have chosen had we been sober, in danger, injured or in the hospital. Our children were ashamed of us. Our spouses couldn't take it again. We made empty promises.

Some "God" alcohol proved to be, demanding more money, time, health, opportunities, and energy from our relationships and careers.

Now that we've found A.A., it should be easy enough to see the A.A. group as a Higher Power: more minds over matter make it so much easier to gain new, healthy habits for dealing with the stresses of life. Working with a sponsor, going to meetings, working the Steps, working with others -- all of these can be part of what we understand our healthier "H.P." to be.

Perhaps another simple concept is to think of the inner spark of life within each of us -- the spark that pushed us to ask for help in firing that devastating boss, Alcohol. When we chose A.A., the desire to keep living proved stronger than the desire to die. (See "The Spiritual Experience, Appendix II, Page 367 in "The Big Book," and -- of course -- Step 2.)

From Your Steering Committee

Tradition Two

For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority... a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants... they do not govern.

Many people become confused by the hierarchy structure of AA. Admittedly, it is one of the biggest paradoxes of the AA program. The way AA is governed is both by democracy and by "benign anarchy" according to Bill W. This allows for every group in AA to have a voice that is guided during their group conscience. This allows for all minority opinions to be heard and examined during decision making processes. This also allows for groups to make decisions that are best for their group. For example, not all groups elect to participate in general service opportunities.

AA is a spiritual program, so it goes without saying that we need to trust our Higher Power in the decision-making process for the group as we do for our own lives. It is God's will, not ours that is done in service to AA. We are merely the vessels that allow God to speak through our fellowship. For many members, the group is their Higher Power so it is up to the trusted servants to guide in ways that are best for all, not just driven by ego and selfish desires.

When an AA member chooses (or is volun-told) to take on a service commitment, they become a servant to other members. And as a trusted servant, their role is to suggest, negotiate, and help the group come to a decision that is best. This removes the member's perceived authority for decision making. Hence, a representative to the larger service structure is to take issues to the group, get the group conscience, and then express the group's position, not his/her own opinion or preference. The second tradition is also where the spirit of rotation was born. This prevents one AA member from taking on too much "authority" within the service structure and imposing his/her own agenda versus the group's combined position.

Questions: Do I criticize or do I trust and support my group officers, AA committees, and office workers? Newcomers? Old-timers?

Although I have been sober a few years, am I still willing to serve my turn with AA chores?

Do I complain about the decisions that my group makes, even though I do not attend the business meetings where these decisions are made?

Tradition Two Checklist

1. Do I criticize or do I trust and support my group officers, AA committees, and office workers? Newcomers? Old-timers?
2. Am I absolutely trustworthy, even in secret, with AA Twelfth Step jobs or other AA responsibilities?
3. Do I look for credit in my AA jobs, praise for my AA ideas?
4. Do I have to save face in group discussion, or can I yield in good spirit to the group conscience and work cheerfully along with it?
5. Although I have been sober a few years, am I still willing to serve my turn at AA chores?
6. In group discussions, do I sound off about matters on which I have no experience and little knowledge?



Concept Two

The General Service Conference of A.A. has become, for nearly every practical purpose, the active voice and the effective conscience of our whole Society in its world affairs.

In 1938, The Alcoholic Foundation was formed as a small trusteeship of A.A. members and nonalcoholic friends. At first the Trustees took jurisdiction over money matters only. Little by little, however, they were obliged to assume many other responsibilities. In 1940, a year after the book “Alcoholics Anonymous” was published, the stock ownership of Works Publishing, Inc. was turned over to the Board of Trustees. In 1941, the A.A. groups began to send contributions to The Alcoholic Foundation for the support of our over-all service office. Later on, the Trustees took jurisdiction over the national magazine, “The A.A. Grapevine.” Eventually, in 1955, there was the meeting of the General Service Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous, in St. Louis, and they eventually were given the general responsibility for the maintenance of A.A.’s world services and so became the service conscience for A.A. as a whole.

The conference consists of Delegates, Trustees, Directors, GSO Staff, and Grapevine Staff. **Conference Advisory Actions** represent recommendations of the Conference committees. Some examples are:

- approval of new Conference-approved literature
- Big Book editions
- suggestions for displaying and selling A.A. literature in groups
- recommendations for the development of new literature

The group elects a general service representative (G.S.R.). The G.S.R. attends district meetings that are made up of the groups in that district. The G.S.R.s elect a district committee member (D.C.M.). The D.C.M. is the vital link between the group’s G.S.R. and the area service structure, including the area’s delegate to the General Service Conference.

Question: What is a Conference Advisory Action? Does our home group’s GSR, DCM, area delegate report back to the group on the highlights of the Conference and Conference Advisory Action?

Mommin' ain't easy, especially sober....

When I was in my active alcoholism, I always joked that I never wanted to be pregnant because it meant nine months without drinking. My reality was that I doubted I could be a mother and knew that I would screw up any kid that was unlucky enough to have me as a mother. When I got sober, I just never shifted my perspective on my abilities to be a mother. At five years sober, I learned I was pregnant. I had recently separated from my husband at the time and it was less than ideal to bring a child into that situation. After reconciliation with my husband, I went through a fairly traumatic and very sudden miscarriage. In the Emergency Room, the doctor offered me "pain management" of my choice. He said, "I could give you a pill or I can give you something in an IV, what would you like." Even in the midst of horrific physical and emotional pain, my AA programming kicked in and I blurted out, "I'm in recovery." The doctor looked at me and said, "Well that changes things doesn't it."

All it changed was that I had to cope with the situation completely sober and feel all the feelings associated with it. The women in AA came to me and offered me love and support- even when I didn't want them there. There were times when I could feel God wrapping His arms around me. There were times when a complete peaceful feeling would wash over me in waves of warmth. God let me know I was not alone in the whole process.

When I got pregnant again four months later, I was scared and anxious about telling anyone or what would happen with this pregnancy. My doctor had me go in weekly and eventually concluded that I would miscarry that child as well. My sponsor and home group held my hand during the whole process, especially when my husband decided that he couldn't be supportive.

On the backend of those losses, my marriage dissolved. I channeled all of my AA acceptance that not only had my marriage failed, but that I was not destined to be a mother. God had let me know twice that it wasn't the plan for me. Then, five months after my marriage ended, God decided to place one of his children in my care. I found out about the baby after attending my first sponsee's wedding.

When I heard my daughter's heartbeat for the first time, I cried. I knew that God hadn't been telling me "no." He had been telling me, "not yet." My home group threw my baby shower for me and held me through my daughter's time in the NICU due to being born prematurely. My best friend who is also in AA is her Godmother and showed up for me on my maternity leave when my own family was unable to do so at the time.

My kiddo is five years old and she is a force of nature. She goes to meetings with me. She tells me she loves my sponsor and my sponsees. She asks me if I need to go to a meeting when I let my human show and lose my temper or am sad. She even helped me with a service commitment at the state convention when my childcare fell through for part of the weekend. I jokingly call her my Ala-Tot. I've struggled with meetings being less than welcoming to a child being there and I've stood in solidarity with other mothers who have to bring their children to meetings in an attempt to save their own sanity.

My sponsor always tells me what a good mother I am, even if I don't always agree. But one thing is true, my daughter has never seen me drink. She never has to see me drink. She doesn't have to know that side of her mom. If she grows up to have inherited my genetics, she will know how to get help and find love in the rooms. And anytime my faith needs adjusting, I just look at the miracle God sent me and know that He walks with me every day.
