From Your Steering Committee

Tradition One

Out of Selfishness

“Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA Unity.”

Alcoholics tend to share two characteristics in common, selfishness and rebellion against being told what to do. What the Tradition One does is combat those two characteristics in order to ensure the continued life of the fellowship. Unity allows us to further squash our selfishness and engage in practices of humility. It is no longer what is best for us individually but what is best for the group as a whole. Tradition One also allows for each member to have equal standing regardless of background, education, social status, financial status, role in outside society, gender, race, creed, or even length of sobriety. We all come to AA in order to heal from the disease of alcoholism. This means that no one member can decide for the entire group. If a member is acting inappropriately, we address the behavior in a kind and loving way to ensure the group's wellness as well as the individual's wellness. We are charged with creating a safe environment for ALL to recover and sometimes that means balancing the needs of the group over the needs of the individual. And we do so because “most individuals cannot recover unless there is a group (Twelve and Twelve, pg. 130).

When we exist in “I” we remain in our illness, when we transition to “we” we exist in wellness. We find our strength and hope in the group. For all to recover, we must remember to put our own selfish desires aside and engage in what is best for the group. The group depends on individuals to exist while simultaneously the individual depends on the group to remain sober. In a world full of division, we find that our unity as alcoholics can ensure the life of our fellowship and our own recovery.

Question: Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support AA as a whole in every way I can, or just the parts that I understand and approve of?

Tradition One Checklist

1. Am I in my group a healing, mending, integrating person, or am I divisive? What about gossip and taking other members' inventories?
2. Am I a peacemaker? Or do I, with pious preludes such as “just for the sake of discussion,” plunge into argument?
3. Am I gentle with those who rub me the wrong way, or am I abrasive?
4. Do I make competitive AA remarks, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in another?
5. Do I put down some AA activities as if I were superior for not participating in this or that aspect of AA?
6. Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support, in every way I can, AA as a whole, or just the parts I understand and approve of?
7. Am I as considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me?
8. Do I spout platitudes about love while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles hostility?
9. Do I go to enough AA meetings or read enough AA literature to really keep in touch?
10. Do I share with AA all of me, the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving the help of fellowship?



Concept One

The final responsibility and the ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship.

However, in 1948, there occurred an event that shook us all. It became known that Dr. Bob was suffering from a fatal illness. As nothing else could, this news drove home the hard fact that he and I were almost the sole links between our virtually unknown Trustees and the movement they served. The Trustees always had relied heavily upon Dr. Bob and me for advice. They had taken a firm grip on money expenditures, but they necessarily turned to us every time that A.A. policy questions arose. Then, too, the groups of that time did not really rely much on the Trustees for the management of their service affairs; they were still looking to Dr. Bob and me. So here was a society whose total functioning was still largely dependent upon the credit and the confidence which, for the time being, its founders happened to enjoy.

The fact had to be faced that A.A.'s founders were perishable. When Dr. Bob and I had gone, who would then advise the Trustees; who could link our little-known Board to our thousands of groups? For the first time it was seen that only a representative conference could take the place of Dr. Bob and me. This gap simply had to be filled without delay. Such a dangerous open end in our affairs could not be tolerated. Regardless of trouble or expense, we had to call an A.A. General Service Conference and deliver our world services into its permanent keeping. It took little imagination to see that future collapse would be the certain penalty if we did not act boldly and decisively. Thus, propelled by events, we did take the necessary action. Now that the Conference is in its second decade, we find that our former fears of the troubles a Conference might involve were largely groundless. The results of the Conference have exceeded our highest expectations. It now stands proven that the A.A. groups can and will take the final responsibility for their world services.

Question: Are we willing to do what it takes to insure that our democracy of world service will work under all conditions?

- Where do we fit in the upside-down triangle of A.A.?
- Are we willing to do what it takes to insure that our democracy of world service will work under all conditions?

Why We Do the Things We Do

One issue at a time

Alcoholism is an incurable disease contracted by you might say, 10% of the population. It is an incurable disease, but it can be arrested. It is no respecter of age, gender, intelligence, religion, or economic status. Why, you might say, 90% of the population can drink with impunity is hard to understand but we who have been in the AA program for a while, know that you can adopt a way of life that removes the obsession to drink without the white knuckling side effects and you will be comfortable in your own skin without the use of medicine. The symptoms of alcoholism are a combination of mental, physical, emotional, and spiritual in nature. The alcoholic awakes every morning to face, "The hideous four horsemen, Terror, Bewilderment, Frustration, Despair." (pg. 151 BB.) Doctors, Counselors, Priests, and Ministers, when afflicted, come to AA to get relief from this horrible disease. When our desperation out-weighs our denial we show up at the doors of Alcoholics Anonymous and discover a road map to a life of peace and happiness that we believed did not exist. Alcoholism is a progressive disease and Alcoholics Anonymous is a progressive solution and not a quick fix. These desperate alcoholics finds a degree of hope and comfort when first exposed to the AA group and the laughter and lighthearted banter going on between the members before the meeting even starts. They hear members sharing about Guilt, Shame, Fear and Insecurity and they identified with these symptoms. They hear laughter when a person describes a horrible incident in their life and they think they are laughing at the horror but, in fact, they discover that the laughter was focused on the absurdity of our alcoholic thinking, at the time, and they all identify with it. If they are fortunate the long, slow process has just begun and each day becomes better than the last. They begin to understand *why they did the*

things they did while under the influence of alcoholism and in the grip of alcoholic thinking. They begin to understand how their irrational fears influenced their decision-making and discover that the solution to that problem is too Live by unselfish and proven principles. They begin to understand that guilt, shame, fear, and insecurity were the core issues that could quickly be put to rest by alcohol and half-way through their second drink everything seemed right with the world. The world had not changed but their perception of it had. To compensate for the fears and insecurities they had to protect their turf, so they learned how to rationalize those established behavioral patterns they were not proud of. Family responsibilities took a backseat to the boozing and their family let them know about it so, back to the bar they went. The guilt and shame weighed heavy on their mind and to drink would take care of that temporarily. In the program they come to learn how to admit their mistakes and make restitution for all those faulty behaviors and get on the positive side of the ledger. "*---Selfishness---Self-Centeredness! That we think is the root of our troubles. Driven by a hundred forms of fear, self-delusion self-seeking and self-pity we step on the toes of our fellows and they retaliate*". (BB pg.62) Can you blame them? There are 12 steps in the program of Alcoholics Anonymous and each step is preparatory to the next. If we give due diligence to every one of those 12 Steps, we evolved into the person we always wished we could become. We can't stop drinking if we can't stop the alcoholic thinking. Again, In the program, each day seems better than the day before. One day at a time. One issue at a time. One solution at a time. I can't explain My AA experience any better than that.
