From Your Steering Committee

Tradition Seven

Every AA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.

This tradition has been tested twice in 2020 for the Salt River Intergroup. Once when we received a bequest from member of Alcoholics Anonymous that was above the GSO guidelines and then again as a result of the decisions made in response to the pandemic that had a negative impact on the operating budget of the Central Office of Salt River Intergroup.

Questions and justifications for accepting money above guidelines and from outside AA were discussed and laid up against this tradition versus Tradition Four which states that every group is autonomous...basically giving a group to act in its best interest as long as it does not affect other groups or AA as a whole.

Historically the pendulum of this tradition has swung from one extreme to the other...we "alcoholics are certainly all-or-nothing people"! It swung from the idea that AA needed vast sums of money...our disease of more...to the notion that we shouldn't have any...always the martyr!

And so while we originally thought that AA and money could never mix...the pendulum stopped swinging and found that "there was a place in AA where spirituality and money would mix, and that was in the hat...thus the concept of self-support through our own contributions. It supports our primary purpose and ensures we are not distracted from it by having too much or too little...functioning with just enough...not more or less than our fair share.

This is truly one of the highest forms of service work...to accept the full financial responsibility of that which has saved our lives. The members of Salt River Intergroup have willingly stepped up to ensure a financial position that will guarantee our future existence...through individual contributions.

How important in my recovery is the feeling of self-respect, rather than the feeling of being always obligation for charity received?



Concept Seven

The Conference recognizes that the Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments: that the Trustees are thereby fully empowered to manage and conduct all of the world service affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous. It is further understood that the Conference Charter itself is not a legal document: that it relies instead upon the force of tradition and the power of the A.A. purse for it's final effectiveness.

This concept may appear to be contradictory; it may look like the collision of an irresistible force with an immovable object. On the one hand we see a Board of Trustees which is invested with complete legal power over A.A.'s funds and services, while on the other hand we find that A.A.'s General Service Conference is clothed with such great traditional influence and financial power that, if necessary, it could overcome the legal rights of the Board of Trustees. It can therefore give the Trustees directives and secure compliance with them-practically speaking.

A number of ideas and concepts were thought of to maintain a balance between the Conference, the Delegates who represent all areas and the Board of Trustees, which is made up of alcoholics and nonalcoholics were abandoned. So a Conference Charter was developed which gives Conference a final and ultimate authority and legally preserves the right of the Trustees to operate like any other business board of directors. Now there is balance maintaining "group conscience" conforming with Traditions one is protected by tradition and the other by law.

Do we act responsibly regarding the "power of the purse"?

Sobriety in the Time of Covid

Well, hasn't it just been a tricky, old time for all of us? And by all of us I mean everyone not just us special people in Alcoholics Anonymous. And then I wondered just what does it mean for us special people in Alcoholics Anonymous?

At the beginning of all this I talked about treating the disease I KNOW I have, not the disease I might get. It seemed important to me to be able to continue to attend meetings. People asked "what will we do? We've never been in this situation before?" And no, we hadn't been exactly. But in Step 3 of the 12 and 12, Bill talks about those alcoholics in recovery that were sent off to WWII. How would they fare without meetings and fellowship? And it turned out that many of them fared better than those who remained at home. Why? How? And could we use that example now?

We have all watched with dawning horror as the world has shut down, with real pain as, one after another, events like the 85th International Convention were cancelled and with utter dismay and sadness at some of the decisions we have had to take in our personal and professional lives. The Steering Committee terminated the contract of the SRI Summer Round Up and closed the doors of Central Office with the heaviest of hearts.

Through this we have all been beset to some extent or another with those familiar feelings of frustration, anger, sadness, disbelief and of course, the Big Daddy of them all, fear. All people can be tortured by negativity, but we alcoholics are like negativity on steroids.

So what then of the flip side? And I fervently believe there is always a flip side! The flip side to 'the yets' that are surely mine if I pick up again are the Promises that continue to come true for me as I live in physical and emotional sobriety.

Firstly, I realized that we in Alcoholics Anonymous are privileged to be better suited to weather this storm than most normal people. We have a set of principles and a program designed to work in our lives and especially in rough going.

To get a glimpse of this I've spoken to many people. They speak of opportunities. Opportunities to use technology in the way I believe it was designed to be – to connect us (though I will admit to being disappointed I'd not purchased shares in Zoom before all this). And haven't we taken that bull by the horns?! All over the world AA is meeting regularly, continually and lovingly via internet. This has led to more opportunities.

Opportunities to connect with others we might not have before or people we were able to reconnect with. My trudging buddy, Cyndee, spoke of going to a meeting where the speaker was from India and I was able to go with my previous sponsee in London to a meeting we both regularly attended when I lived there. And what a gift those experiences have been. In a world that is experiencing isolation in a way we intrinsically know is dangerous, we are making new friendships and relationships and recommitting to old ones.

We have been given the chance to do and be of service in new and challenging ways. Several people I've spoken to have said the same thing in different ways. Being available to the struggling alcoholic be they in for 5 days or 5 years or 5 decades is still our primary purpose. How can you answer that call?

This has also been an opportunity for reflection, for working through fears (or not) and a chance to learn about ourselves and who we want to be. My good friend says despite a rocky and angry time of biting her tongue at the beginning, she has been able to learn about compassion and what that looks like for her. She has the chance to grow that some more if she so chooses.

What a great example of how we can put the principles into practical application in our lives. And perhaps this is our greatest opportunity as alcoholics in AA. We get to put our actions where our mouths have been. We get to live this program so that we CAN live happy and useful lives regardless of the outside influences of life. If you're in doubt read the last 5 chapters of the story, Keys to the Kingdom.

If you're new, and we're all new in this evolving world, I hope you will choose the flip side. That you will honor and value your sobriety. That you will take the opportunities offered to live the example we are privileged to be. Terry L.

Relapse: Like Dancing with a Gorilla

Praying for Potatoes

One of the things I have always enjoyed about A.A. meetings is our ability to poke fun at each other, in a lighthearted way. We laugh at things that others would consider to have been tragic incidents in our lives but we seem to have come to terms with these past negative experiences and what we are really laughing at is the absurdity of what our old way of thinking. Sometimes we need to have things explained to us in simple terms. The world of A.A. is ripe with metaphors, similes, and allegories that make the learning process much easier to understand. With all of the re-learning we go through to help us in changing our old way of thinking, we are faced with the task of setting new principles, new disciplines and new priorities in place for our actions and behaviors in the future.

Starting with the first and most important priority, we have to be convinced that, we "*are like men who have lost their legs, they never grow new ones*". (BB CH.3) It can't be put any better than that. Then you may hear it said about relapse: *It's the first drink that gets you drunk, not the forth fifth or, you may hear, Taking that first drink is like dancing with a gorilla, the dance isn't over till the gorilla says your done*. These things are truths that we all hear at meetings but these things won't stop anyone from picking up a drink if they're not done yet

In A.A. we hear a lot about prayer and meditation and it seems that everyone has their own way of defining what that means to them. Some may be reunited with the religion of their childhood, while others may feel that they are agnostics and seem to find a sort of neutral approach in finding a power greater than themselves, and that seems to work for them. Then there are those that consider themselves atheists and, as it says in the 12X12 (step two). "A, one-time, Vice President of the American Atheist Society got through with room to spare." However we, as individuals, frame our own approach to how we incorporate this concept into our lives is equally acceptable, as long as it replaces our own, failed way of thinking.

What we pray for is another, sometimes, misunderstood practice that may be clarified by a few metaphors that we hear in meetings. Asking God to cure someone of an illness seems, well meaning but misguided. If God worked his wonders at that level, *the hospitals would be full of sinners and the people we pray for would all be healthy and happy*. I can only pray for the understanding and strength to deal with these things when they are presented as it is suggested in step eleven, "*praying only for knowledge of his will for us and the power to carry that out.*" (step 11) i.e. God, please show me what to do, and please give me the strength to do it; I do not do well on my own.

Most of the principles I live by today are backed up by stories that *illustrate a point* that may have been easy to misunderstand when my old way of thinking was involved. The next thing that I find important is that I have to do the things that I learn when I ask for guidance and not just give them lip service, after all, "*If you're going to pray for potatoes, you better grab a hoe*".
